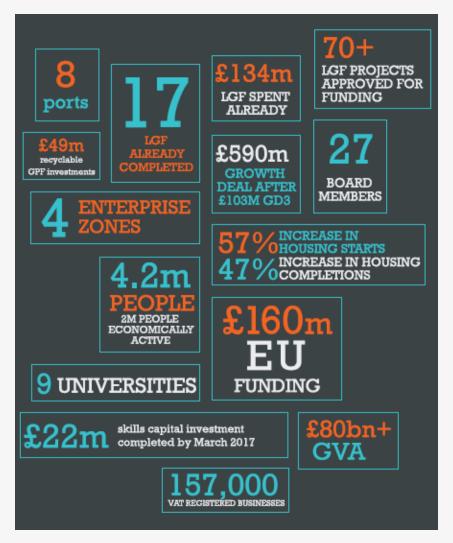

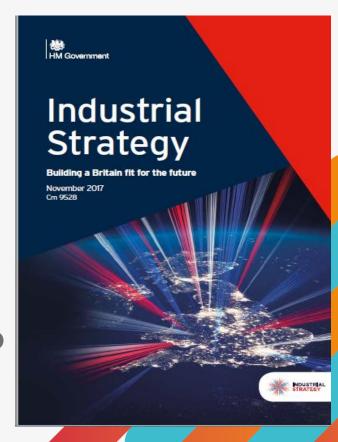

- Careers Strategy published £60m for apprenticeships to increase take up by young people and those from disadvantaged backgrounds

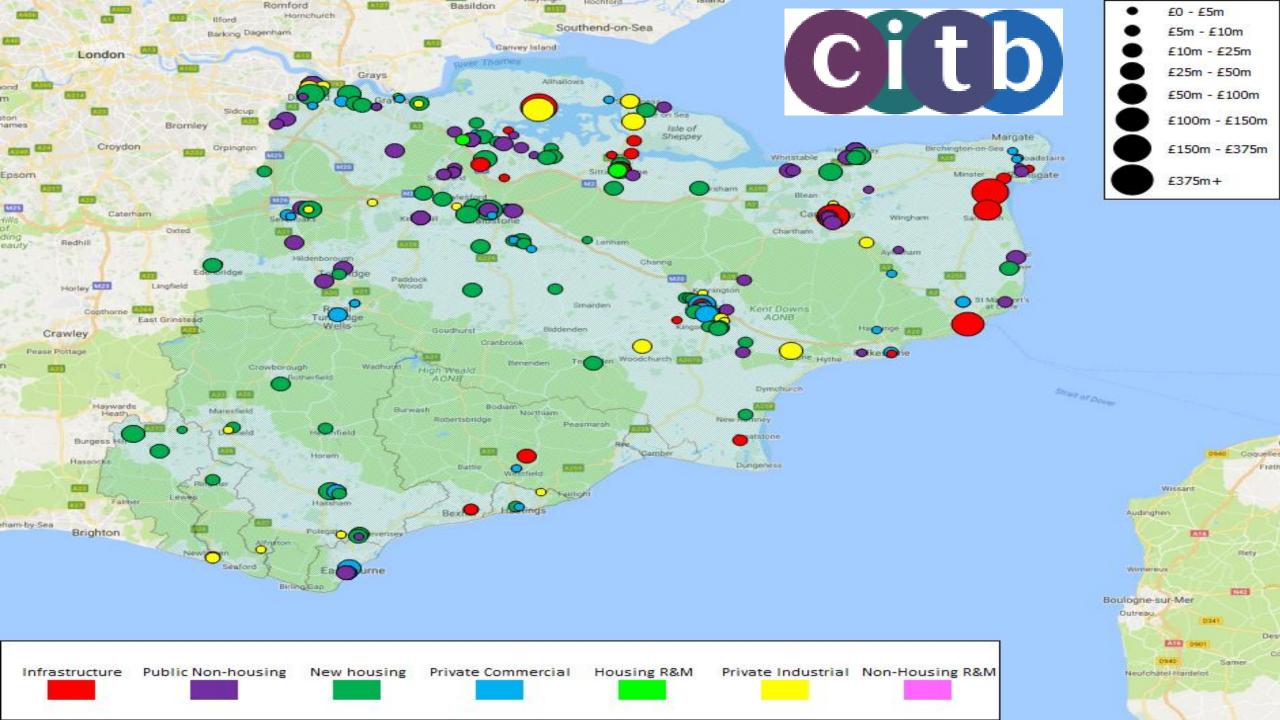

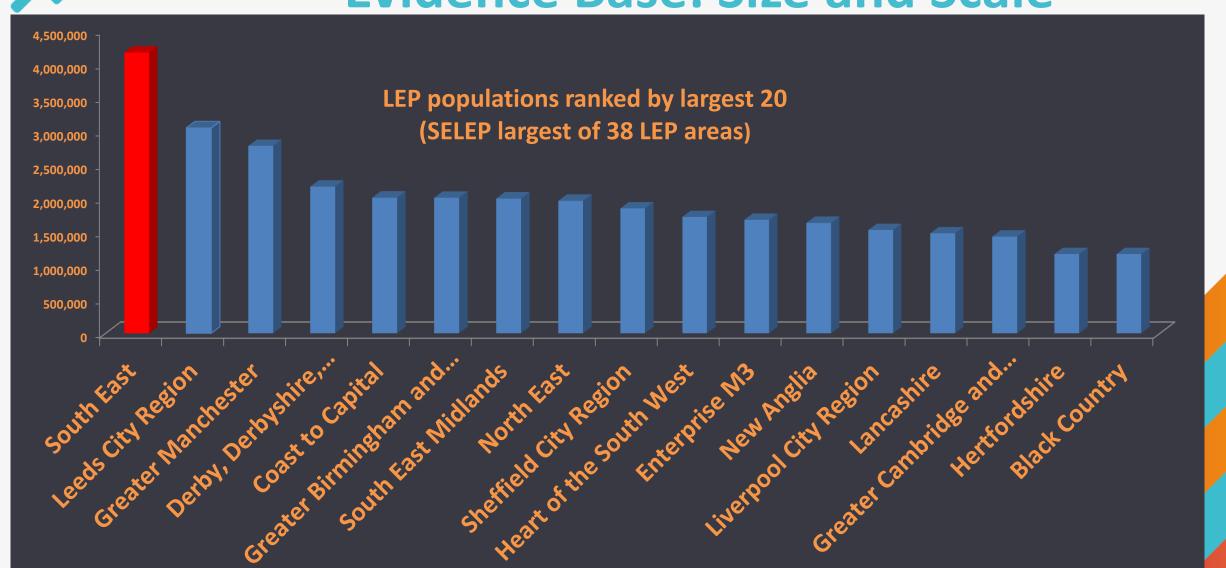
Evidence Base Headlines

- The SELEP area has large numbers of employees and / or enterprises in health, care, manufacturing, construction, finance, IT & creative, logistics and finance.
- There are also large numbers of vacancies and projected growth due to factors such as 300,000 new homes projected across the SELEP area and specific events such as Public Health England's relocation.
- Apprenticeship starts across the SELEP area have stayed fairly static over the last few years, remaining at around 32,000 in the context of a nearly half a million 15-24 year olds.
- The SELEP area has had nearly 368,000 job vacancies in the past 12 months, with large numbers in priority sectors.



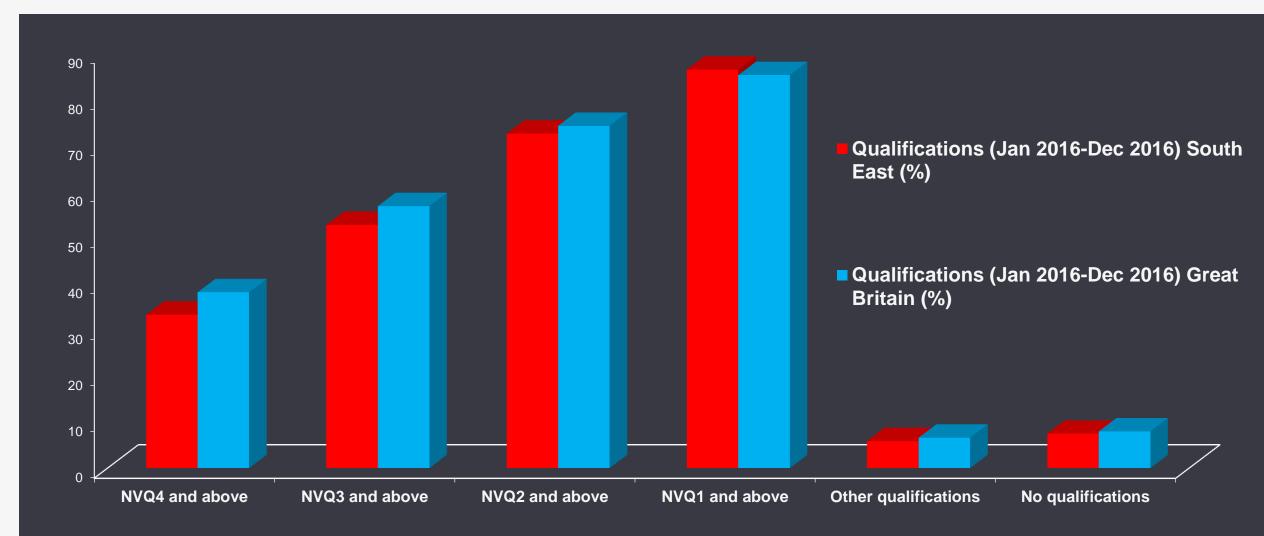


Evidence Base: Size and Scale



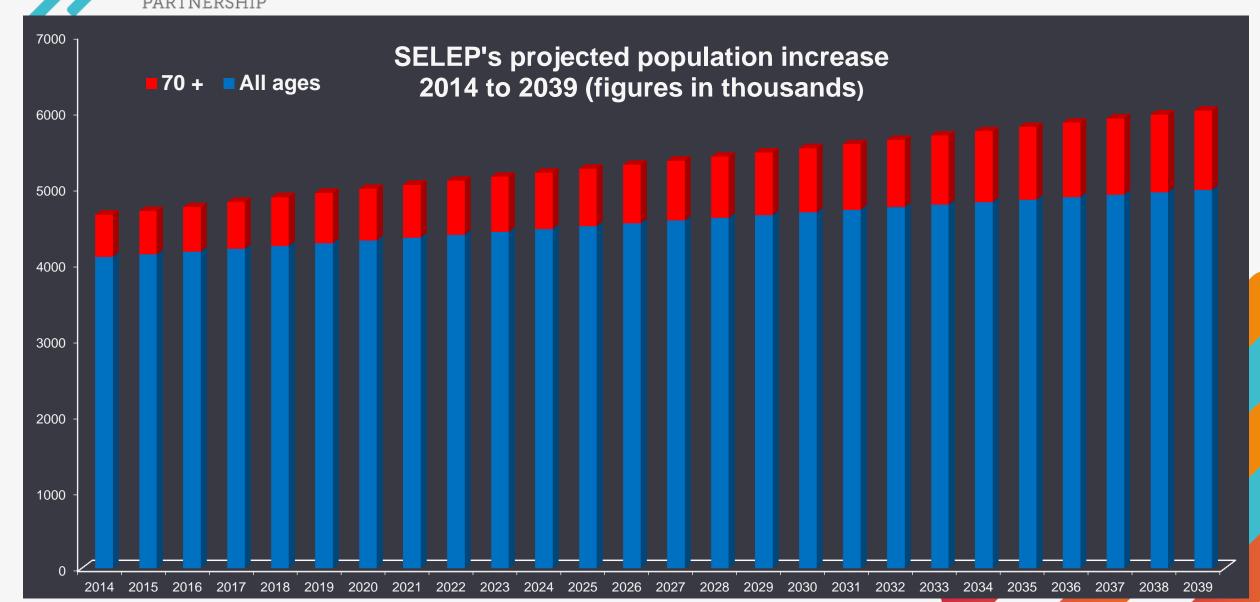

Chelmsford ITP – Mill Yard (Essex)

- Due to complete in March 2018
- Partnership working between SELEP, ECC,
 Chelmsford City Council, Greater Anglia and Network Rail
- Station redevelopment and accessibility improvements
- Supporting the delivery of **2000 homes** in the town centre

- £3m LGF allocation (£2m LGF spend to date)
- Developer and Network Rail contributions
- (£1.3m developer contributions and £3.2m National Station Improvement Programme).







- Project due to complete in May 2018
- Phase 1 of the project is near completion

North Bexhill Access Road (East Suusex)

- 2.4km single carriageway road link between the A269 and the Bexhill Hastings Link Road
- £16.6 m LGF allocation approved in November 2015
- To unlock planned employment growth in North Bexhill, including 780 new homes and 38,000m² of commercial floorspace.
- The construction of the first 20,000m² business space is due to commence on opening in spring 2018.

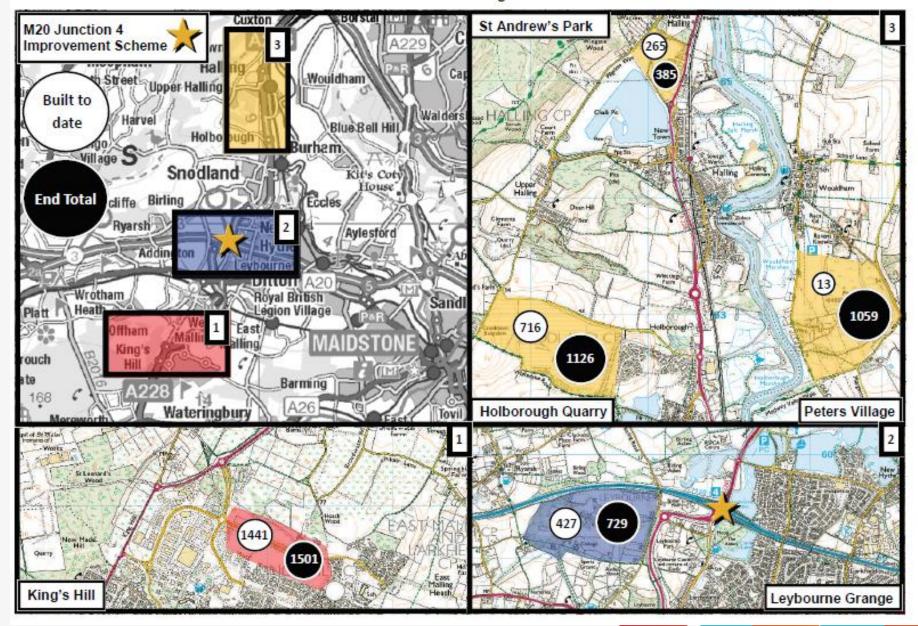




M20 Junction 4 (Kent)

- Motorway bridge widening
- Project completed in February 2017
- £2.2m LGF allocation and £3.6m developer contributions
- Unlock 3,729 dwellings and 104,000 square metres of commercial development
- 31 small or medium enterprises SMEs subcontracted during construction works of which 20 were local
